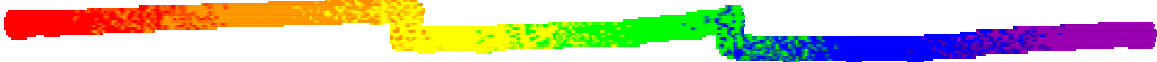

and will need some extra help along the way. Driving girls, making phone calls, bringing snacks, working on scrapbooks, and helping the girls learn their memory parts are great ways to help. Two hours a month would make a world of difference.

Memory work is very important in Rainbow. Your daughter has a memory part to learn at each station. Ask your daughter if she needs help. A board member will also be happy to help her. But she needs to ask for help and learn her part each term. Help

your daughter to learn her part or ask for help early in the term (that would be now).

PARENTS DID YOU KNOW



Did you know that each Rainbow girl is supposed to open her Bible to a chapter and verse each night. The Chapter and verse are Genesis 9. They are supposed to open their Bible each night and then look at the verse in the morning and close the Bible. You can help by reminding the girls to do this and read it aloud with them.

Did you know that each girl who has been through an Installation has Memory work. Some have more than others, but all have memory work. Ask you daughter to recite her part for you, and help her if she is having trouble. Also call a board member if you aren't able to help your daughter. Any board member will help in any way they can.

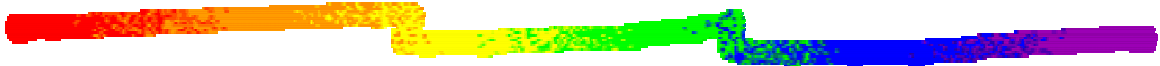

RAINBOW KNOWLEDGE



The Bellingham Assembly is one of 5 assemblies in the north-west corner of the state.

The International Order of the Rainbow for Girls (IORG) is a youth group for girls between the ages of 11 and 20. Rainbow is not a religion, but rather a service organization. Local groups (Assemblies) are sponsored by Masonic affiliations, usually either a local Masonic Lodge, Order of the Eastern Star Chapter, or Order of the Amaranth. The girls learn about charity, hope, and service through their work and involvement with the local and Grand service projects annually. On April 6, 1922, the degrees of the International Order of the Rainbow for Girls was first exemplified on a class of one

hundred seventy-one girls in the auditorium of the Scottish Rite Temple, McAlester, Oklahoma.

Members of the Rainbow are active in their churches, schools, and communities. They raise money for various charities through fundraisers such as bake sales, dinners, and car washes, and they extend themselves in service to their communities, churches and their sponsoring organizations. Rainbow Girls have many fun activities and opportunities to make lifelong friendships.

The leadership structure of Rainbow begins with the local Assembly and extends to the State and International Assemblies. Each local Assembly is made up of five line officers (Rainbow

Girls who lead the Assembly under the direction of a Mother Advisor and Advisory Board) and thirteen appointed officers. The adult governing body of each Rainbow Assembly is known as the Advisory Board and is comprised of seven to fifteen adults from various Masonic organizations and parents or legal guardians of Rainbow girls.
